The first impressionist exhibition

The first Impressionist exhibition took place from April 15 to May 15, 1874. Led by the French artists Claude Monet, Edgar Degas, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Camille Pissarro and Berthe Morisot, they called themselves the Anonymous Society of Painters, Sculptors, Engravers, etc.

Thirty artists displayed 165 works at the photographer Nadar's former studio at 35 Boulevard des Capucines. The building was modern and the paintings were modern: pictures of contemporary life painted in a technique that looked unfinished to the art critics and general public. And, the works were on sale! Right there. (Although they had to

Louis Leroy, a critic for Le Charivari, entitled his nasty, satirical review "Exhibition of Impressionists" which was inspired by Claude Monet's painting Impression: Sunrise, 1873. Leroy meant to discredit their work. Instead, he invented their identity.

However, the group did not call themselves "Impressionists" until their third show in 1877. They were also called the "Independents" and the "Intransigents," which implied political activism. (Pissarro was the only avowed anarchist.)

Art is a form of communication. You might think you make art as a form of self-expression, but you know that your work is incomplete until people see it and respond to it. You understand the synergy that erupts when you are in a room full of people looking at and talking about your art. Nothing in the artist's experience compares.

Exhibiting your art provides a space and a time frame for people to appreciate the true colours, lines, textures. patterns, and scale. Art takes on richness in this environment that it doesn't have when it's sitting in your studio.

Perhaps more importantly, exhibiting your art allows you to have a dialogue with people about the work. You can't help but learn and grow from these experiences.


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
How to hang your painting

Well another year has gone by and we are finally exhibition month. So how are your going to hang your painting. Why Use Wire and D-Rings? If you've ever been woken in the middle of the night by a painting that's fallen off the wall because the piece of string hanging it has broken, then you won't need persuading to use picture wire instead. Wire is stronger than string, and the knots won't come undone. Another advantage of using wire over string to hang a painting is that it doesn't relax or stretch, causing the picture to hang lower or skew. D-rings, which get fastened onto the canvas stretchers or frame with a screw, are designed to lie flat. The advantage of this is that when you're propping the painting up against another canvas, the D-rings won't poke holes into it (though obviously it can still scratch a surface). Galleries like this as it helps protect paintings stacked on a rack. Decide how far from the top you want to position the D-rings. You don't want them so high the wire will show above the top edge of the painting, nor so low down the painting will lean over when it's hung. Aim for about a guarter or third of the way down.

Tightening the picture wire knot is easiest using a pair of pliers. Grip the ends of the wire with the pliers, then pull and the knot will tighten. Cut the short end if needed, then twist it around the other length of wire. Flatten the end with the pliers to ensure there's no sharp end of wire to catch a finger on.


