Collaborative Dam Project

As part of the WAGI4 Annual Members Exhibition, WAG members were to create a collaborative work. It was suggested by Janet Dalton and Sue Southwood of using the work of renowned artist Imants Tillers as a reference point. The project was postponed due to time, funding and management constraints. The Committee then agreed on using Warragamba Dam and environs as the theme. This fitted in with our WAGI4 'My Backyard' theme and also community concern over raising the dam wall. The 22 minute video 'Give a Dam' was inspirational as it covered the consequences of world heritage wilderness destruction concisely.

At a meeting in mid August we committed to this project and a Stage One discussion was held. As a result of asking for help in managing the project, Els Dirickx contacted Roswitha Giersch, offering her

'En Plein Air' Workshop


The last workshop for 2019 was our November CGT held at Picton Botanical Gardens 'En Plein Air' run by Steve Underwood.

HOW TO MAKE YOUR OWN GESSO

Gesso is used to prime a canvas or a wooden surface before painting to make it smooth and give your work a consistent texture. It also protects the canvas fibres and gives



flexibility to the surface. There are many recipes online for making your own Gesso using ingredients that are available in any \$2 shop.

The best recipes I found after searching for hours and watching demonstration videos, used Baby Powder. The Make You Own Gesso video I watched listed the following necessities and ingredients:

- An empty jar, stirring stick or plastic spoon, measuring spoons or cups.
- One quarter cup of baby powder,
- One quarter cup of simple white school glue,
- A half cup of white acrylic paint,
- 4 tablespoons of warm water.

That's a ratio of I part talc / I part glue / and 2 parts paint. The water is just to make the mixing easier and allow you to obtain the consistency you prefer by altering the amount.

I needed a fairly large amount of Gesso to cover my board so I doubled each ingredient as I added it to my empty jar, trying to stick to the ratio 1:1:2. I quickly blended out lumps with a pencil, popped the lid on and gave it a good shake.

When I applied it using a wide paint brush, it was a little too thick to glide on easily, so after struggling to cover the entire surface I dipped my brush in water and brushed over the whole thing to give me a nice smooth surface to paint on. Back to the video:

- No Gesso was a disaster,
- The plaster Of Paris example cracked and
- The example using baby powder

was almost identical to the storebought Liquitex Gesso.
